Congratulations to you and your staff for the great improvements on the NAEP scores. Math scores increased from 52nd to 40th and Reading increased from 49th to 39th. Those are impressive gains and demonstrate the great efforts that you and your staff have made for the individual students at your school. The professional learning, meetings and use of assessments have made a difference in the lives of your students.

If you are a first or second-year principal, I encourage

In July, I had the opportunity to be a first-time attendee at the NAESP conference in National Harbor, Maryland, thanks to the Glenys Mason Scholarship. The Glenys Mason Scholarship

is awarded to an AAESA member who has never attended the NAESP annual convention. While attending a District IV meeting, I heard about the scholarship opportunity and decided to apply. I wasn't expecting to be chosen, but was honored upon hearing the news. Wow, I am so grateful for the opportunity, as it was such a fantastic experience!

Arriving at National Harbor at the Gaylord Convention Center, I was unsure what to expect of my week but hopeful it would be beneficial, enjoyable, and worthwhile. My initial excitement came from the beautiful location chosen for this year's convention. As administrators, we often do not take the time to go somewhere for professional development and allow others to pour into our buckets. Instead, we just keep pouring into others' buckets. I immediately felt relaxed as I unpacked, took a long walk alongside the Potomac River, and enjoyed the sunset.

Each day at the convention was full of uplifting keynote speakers, high-quality and engaging breakout sessions, and opportunities to network and meet fellow administrators from Alabama and across the country. Each activity and opportunity allowed me to learn, grow, and reflect on myself as a leader and administrator.

One of the most memorable experiences from my week was the keynote speaker on Monday, Houston Kraft, co-founder of CharacterStrong. His message about character, social and emotional learning, leadership, and compassion was powerful and insightful. We often tell our students to "throw kindness like confetti," but kindness must be more deeply rooted and thoughtful. He shared that confetti kindness is convenient, but deep kindness requires clarity, com-

petence and consistency. True kindness is not free as it costs time, giving of ourselves, humility, and vulnerability. It is proactive and often harder than we say it is to our students. As school leaders we must teach and model true kindness to our students and staff. When we show and give true kindness we can change our school and the people we lead. Houston's message truly made me think deeper about kindness and my ability to change the culture and climate of my school through true kindness.

Another opportunity I had while at the NAESP conference was to participate in an assistant principal panel. This panel was utilized to help NAESP learn more about how assistant principals are utilized around the country so that they can provide more opportunities for quality professional development moving forward. I was encouraged by fellow assistant principals within this panel and came away with an appreciation of the opportunities I am given through my local school, district, AAESA and CLAS to grow and learn. I realized that I have many more opportunities to grow and learn than many others around the country and I hope I never take them for granted. We are truly blessed to have such strong organizations such as AAESA and CLAS that pours into us as leaders on a daily basis through professional development opportunities, advocacy, and networking. If you are not an active member, find a way to get involved.

Last, I came away from the conference with a full bucket ready to tackle a new year. I had the opportunity to network and gain new friendships with other NAESP convention participants from Alabama and around the country. While on the surface these dinners and gatherings seem trivial, they allowed me to find connections, feel seen and heard in challenges and problems I face regularly, and come away with new ideas. Surviving the First Year as a New School Principal

The first year of a new principal's tenure at a school is charged with difficult obsta-

cles. Everyone is trying to figure you out and trying to leave a positive impression on you. As a principal, one of your primary responsibilities is to strike a healthy balance between implementing change, cultivating connections, and identifying what individuals and groups are already doing very well. It requires a sharp capacity for observation as well as a large investment of your time on your part. Even seasoned principals who are taking over at a new school shouldn't come in with the expectation that everything would be the same as it was at the school they most recently led.

Because of the wide range of differences between educational institutions, the majority of the first year will be spent gaining familiarity with the environment. The first year is a key time for a new school principal, and the following ideas can help guide you through that first year.

Make sure you are aware of the expectations of your superintendent. If you and the superintendent do not share the same vision for the school, it is hard for you to be an effective school principal at any point in time. It is necessary for you to constantly have a good understanding of what their

- expectations are. The superintendent will serve as your immediate supervisor. If you want to be a successful principal, cultivating a productive working relationship with your superintendent is necessary.
- 2. Establish genuine and professional connections with the students, faculty, and administration of the school. Pay close attention to what it is that they have to say to you. Always demonstrate that you are engaged in the topic at hand and make it a point to determine whether there is an underlying problem or issue that either you or your team can resolve. The school community will view actions taken immediately to address and resolve issues positively.
- 3. Maintain order. It is essential to be organized. Because the role encompasses such a wide range of responsibilities, a lack of organization on your part might result in uncertainty, not only for you, but also for the people you are tasked with directing. Being disorganized results in disorder and turmoil in a learning environment.
- 4. Always keep in mind that you are accountable for everything that takes place in your school. It does not matter what the circumstance is, you should never use the word "blame." Instead, you should ask yourself; "What is my responsibility for this problem, and what strategic thinking or strategic actions can I take to improve the situation?"

- 5. Realize that the most important thing that happens in any school is learning and that the primary reason you are working in that setting is for the benefit of the students. Make judgments based on what will benefit the children and the learning that they will experience the most. Naturally, the Triple Bottom Line, which consists of People, Planet, and Profit, is also significant; therefore, it is imperative that you provide support for your teams, ensuring that sustainability is incorporated into your curriculum mapping and school administration, and keep the school's budget in the black at all times in order to reinvest any profits back into the school.
- Create teams that are amazingly effective.
 Find ways to make use of the hidden skills that your instructors possess. Facilitate the formal and informal empowerment of leaders. Learn to delegate.
- 7. Educate yourself on the customs of the community and the district. Every town and school are distinct from one another. Adhere to the norms, customs, and traditions of your school specific community. If you make a change to an event that has been going on for a long time, like the Christmas program, you will have parents and teachers in an uproar at your door. Adopting these customs will save you the trouble of creating additional difficulties for yourself.

Forming a committee consisting of students, parents, and members of the community should be done if it becomes necessary at some point in the future to adjust. The committee should be informed of your position, and you should consider deferring to their judgment, so that the decision does not rest only on your shoulders.

Finally, keep in mind that the ultimate objective is to have a successful school year. Take deliberate action and collaborate with students, teachers and parents to develop a fresh strategic plan to steer the school toward a prosperous future.



The Road to Become the Alabama NDP

One of the highest honors that a principal can receive is recognition as a National Distinguished Principal by NAESP. As a former NDP and current chair of the NDP selection committee, I am excited to begin

the selection process to find our next recipient. In the fall semester, each of the ten AAESA districts will nominate and vote for the candidate that they choose to represent their district at the state level. Nominees must meet the following requirements to move on to the next phase of the process:

- **1.** Be a member of NAESP for at least one year prior to the time of nomination and maintain membership through the conclusion of the NAESP Award Ceremony.
- 2. Serve as a practicing principal with at least five years of experience in the principalship.
- 3. Plan to continue as a practicing principal during their year of recognition.

4. Must demonstrate evidence of outstanding contributions to the community and to the education profession.

The next step requires district nominees to complete the NDP application to include several essays with examples of leadership within their school. Then, the applications are reviewed by the NDP selection committee. The selection committee consists of two previous Alabama NDPs, the State Superintendent's Representative, and two other principals from across the state. The committee scores each application based on a rubric to narrow the finalists down to the top three candidates. These finalists will receive a school visit conducted by the selection committee members in February so that students, parents, faculty members, and stakeholders can be interviewed and a discussion can occur regarding their experiences as a principal and the impacts made within their community. The Alabama NDP winner is typically announced sometime in March and notified during a surprise school visit.

In October, the Alabama NDP and a guest will represent the state at the award ceremony in Washington, DC along with the other candidates from across the country who represent their states. The award winners have an opportunity to attend formal ceremonies and receptions at some iconic places during their time in DC. They also become a part of the prestigious NDP alumni who convene annually during the NAESP national conference each summer. Good luck to all of the district nominees!


- Must be a currently practicing elementary/middle school building administrator

Bringing Books to Life Through "One School, One Book"

Motivating kids to read can sometimes be a daunting task. Finding the right titles or topics of interest can be diffi-

cult, especially when you are competing against technology and other activities that draw students' attention away from reading books. So how can a school create the magic and excitement for reading? With *One School, One Book*!

One School, One Book is a program sponsored by the Read to Them Foundation, which encourages schools to engage everyone with reading the same book title together as a community. From the students, to their parents, to the school secretary, and even the custodians, everyone participates with reading the same book and engaging in a variety of activities that surround the book content. Some activities include trivia contests, character dress-up days, and in-person read-alouds by prominent individuals in the community.

For the Kilby Laboratory School, *One School, One Book* went to higher heights by producing full-scale musical theater productions based on the book title selected for the school. As a STEAM-focused school, Kilby faculty wanted to have a culminating event involving the arts to conclude the community-wide book exploration. Students across all grade levels (K -6) were invited to audition and participate in the theater production to be performed at the culminating Spring musical for the school.

With the coordination of the Kilby Media Specialist, Misty Buerhaus, year one of the One School, One Book program at Kilby allowed students to engage with the book, "James and he Giant Peach". The students were able to have science discussions about bugs, which correlated with the characters in the book. The students also engaged with science as they used dry ice to make peach ice cream. There were character dress-up days and even designated days for guest readers, which included the University of North Alabama Vice President, the Dean of Nursing, the University Athletic Director, and even the head coach of the men's basketball team! The culminating event was magical as the characters came to life in a musical production of "James and the Giant Peach". The musical was a huge hit, selling out multiple shows. More importantly, it left the students excited and wanting to do more with the reading program.

Kilby Reading Specialist, Dr. Angel Tomlinson spear-headed year two. Her creativity led to the reading of "Willy-Wonka and the Chocolate Factory". The second year created even more excitement for reading and all the fun activities that went along with the reading program. In addition to the trivia questions, students had the opportunity to purchase Wonka bars in hopes of winning a "Golden Ticket". The Golden Tickets led to prizes that included eating their favorite lunch meal with the administrator! In all, the *One School, One Book* program led to increased excitement for reading, more parental engagement with parents reading to their children, and an increase in our ACAP scores in reading from the previous year!



FY24 Educational Budget Battles Are Heating Up!

The House FY24 education appropriations bill approved by a subcommittee and awaiting full committee action would make significant cuts to federal K-12 education programs, notably an 80% cut to Title I (-\$14.7

billion) and the complete elimination of Title II's \$2.19 billion. NAESP strongly opposes these and the other reductions in the bill and has sent letters to the House Appropriations Committee urging them to reject these cuts.

NAESP has sent out an action alert to members residing in

- congressional districts represented by members of the House Appropriations Committee urging them to reject the cuts as well.
- NAESP will be sending out an action alert with messaging to all members of Congress in the near future.

As you may know, the Senate Appropriations Committee passed its FY24 education appropriations bill without significant funding cuts and, in fact, increased funding for both Title I and IDEA by \$175 million along with preserving all of the funding for Title II.

 Below is a helpful funding chart highlighting the current House and Senate proposed FY24 funding levels for key K-12 education programs. The good news is that the committee passed this bill with huge bipartisan support, 26-2.

The stark funding differences between the House and Senate appropriations bill is setting up a consequential round of funding negotiations starting after Labor Day. The federal fiscal year starts on October 1.

Administrators will get paid exactly like nationally board certified teachers will be paid. (It will come from the state department, taxes will be taken out and will count towards retirement).

New principals will have a mentor to take advantage of this law).

This bill will also cover the numeracy act principal leadership component. (The numeracy act will create the panel that will develop the principal leadership component).


